Don Bair Named Outstanding Citizen of the Year



Donald A. Bair, known throughout the community for his work to teach people who have special needs to lead independent lives, is the chamber's Outstanding Citizen of the Year.

"Don Bair is committed to making our community a better place to live – not just for you and me, but for everyone," said Carrie Stuart, chamber president. "Sometimes when people hear of a need, they don't do anything about it. But Don is a doer and a helper. Where there is a need, he is there. He lives his life to help others. Don is the embodiment of an outstanding citizen, and the

chamber is pleased to recognize his tireless work to strengthen Adams County."

Nearly 40 years ago, Bair's life was changed the instant a drunk driver veered into his car, killing his two daughters, Heather and Debbie, and severely injuring his son Alex.

While many would not have been able to find the strength to move on, Bair made a decision to turn the tragic experience into something good. Shortly after the crash, he began traveling to the Adams County Courthouse to tell his story to people charged with driving under the influence. His goal was to prevent them from becoming repeat offenders.

His son, who suffered mental disability from the accident, inspired Bair to work with Adams County's disabled citizens. Through The Arc of Adams County, he has helped disabled citizens learn how to work, live and volunteer, guiding them to believe and trust in their abilities and lead independent lives.

Bair has been a coach and mentor with the Special Olympics for more than 30 years. Most recently, he mentored Michael Silvis, who advanced in the program as global messenger, coach, then attended the Athlete Leadership University. Throughout the year, he leads the athletes in helping residents of Cross Keys Village - The Brethren Home Community play bingo.

Bair also teaches a special needs Sunday School class, called The Miracle Workers, at St. John's Lutheran Church in Littlestown. The group volunteers at the church with the support of the congregation and staff. They offer the message a few times each year and visit other congregations.

Through his church, Bair assists Appalachian Outreach Inc., working to relieve the strain of poverty on the people of Appalachia in West Virginia by gathering and delivering furniture. Bair is also involved with Habitat for Humanity.

"Don is always ready to volunteer for anyone in need, but I think the most amazing gift he shares with all of us in Adams County is his ability to share his unconditional love, knowledge and support to all in need," said Jo Ann Smith The Arc of Adams County advocate. "He believes everyone has the ability to change someone else's life for the better."


Joann Motter Named Chamber Volunteer of the Year



Board of Directors

The board met on Thursday, Sept. 28, in the Conference Room of the Adams Electric Cooperative. New members were approved, including Global Equipment Excavating & Contracting, Quarry Critters Alpaca Ranch, Renn Kirby Chevrolet Buick and S.T. Heller-Author. Tickets to the Holiday Jackpot Raffle were distributed to board members to sell to membership. The meeting adjourned early to allow for a strategic planning session with Chuck Ewart.



Holiday Jackpot Raffle Committee

The committee is finalizing plans for the event, held at the Wyndham Gettysburg Hotel on Thursday, Dec. 7, from 5-7 p.m. The Wyndham is the host sponsor, while Members 1st Federal Credit Union will sponsor the drink tickets. An entertainment sponsor and table sponsors are being sought, as well as premium silent auction items. Committee members have decided to host a canned food drive as part of the event to benefit the Adams County Food Pantry through South Central Community Action Programs. The next planning meeting is set for Nov. 2 at 2 p.m. at Mason Dixon Distillery.

Legislative Committee

The Legislative Committee met Sept. 14 at Gettysburg Eddie's. Holly Sutphin provided a report on behalf of Congressman Perry. Congress has approved \$15.25 billion for hurricane relief and raised the debt ceiling until Dec. 8. Perry did not support this action, preferring rather to see a real budget worked out. He is supportive of Congress finding a permanent resolution to DACA. Representative Dan Moul reported he is concerned about the state's budget picture, saying the state will have \$600 million in debt from last year's budget and new debt totaling \$2.2 billion. Moul and other representatives worked voluntarily over the summer recess to find funding and/or cuts for the budget. They analyzed 216 special funds and found 41 of those funds to have \$1.257 billion of unused dollars. Also present at the committee meeting was Bev Frey, Senator Alloway's new legislative aide, as well as numerous chamber members.

Marketing Advisory Committee

The committee chair met with chamber staff to set the committee agenda for the next three years, based on the strategic planning process. It was agreed that a new website, chamber image marketing and development of a communications plan is paramount to the success of the chamber. Coming off the success of the Adams County Living publication, the group also discussed a rebranding of the Chamber Chat newsletter into a business journal, with plans to launch the new publication in early 2018.

Membership Committee

The committee met on Tuesday, Oct. 3, to discuss the member-focused pillar of the new strategic plan. There is definitely a need to recruit new committee members to

assist with action items. This plan is lofty, but it puts the chamber in a better place at the end of three years. The next membership event is the County Connections breakfast on Oct. 17 at the Adams County Library in Gettysburg. The focus of the next meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 7, will be awards/presentations.

Nominating Committee

The nominating committee has submitted 10 candidates for six seats on the board of directors to membership for voting. Winning candidates will be announced during the 98th Annual Meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 8, at The Lodges at Gettysburg.

Plans are underway for the Sunday, April 8, event. This year, the event will be held at a new location -- Liberty Mountain Resort. The committee is welcoming many new members, including Chad-Alan Carr of Gettysburg Community Theatre, Kim Hackett of the VNA of Hanover & Spring Grove, Heather Holt of Cintas, Liz Johnides of The Markets at Hanover, Rose Lansing of the Redbud House, Charles Rousey of Liberty Mountain Resort and individual member Caroline Smith. The next meeting is set for Nov. 29 at 11:30 a.m. at the Refectory of the Lutheran Theological Seminary of Gettysburg to start planning for the 2018 event on Sept. 8-9.




Dancing with the Local Stars to Benefit YWCA, Arts Council






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
