ACNB Bank established a scholarship award in 2016 through the Harrisburg Area Community College Foundation to support the college's efforts to provide financial

In addition, he is a graduate of the Trust Investment School of the Cannon Financial Institute.

The **Adams County Library System** website has received a makeover to make it easier to use. With the advancement of technology, the website has become a digital branch with access to resources 24/7. Users can also browse an ever-growing events calendar and digital collection, make online meeting room reservations and register for events. The new website is mobile and tablet friendly. It also has a BrowseAloud feature to accommodate people who have challenges with vision impairment, attention and focus disorders, dyslexia and language barriers. Adams Electric Cooperative named Sarah Malewicki an administrative specialist in the human resources department. She was a campus visit coordinator in Gettysburg College's admissions office. She is a graduate of Delaware Valley College. Jake Strausbaugh was named journeyman third class in the Gettysburg District. He was a first-year apprentice.

The board of directors for **Adams Electric Cooperative** is returning \$1.75 million in Ownership Rewards to 32,500 current and former members, raising the total amount given back to members to almost \$43 million for all retirement years. The money being retired represents a loan of capital to the cooperative for routine operations and expansion, with the understanding that the "loan" will be paid back to members in subsequent years as Ownership Rewards. Each member is allocated margins (the difference between the co-op's revenues and expenses) based upon his or her use of electricity. This allocation continues to grow each year as the member purchases electricity from the cooperative.

Destination Gettysburg has launched a new marketing program to highlight the growing craft alcohol industry in Adams County. The Adams County Pour Tour is a partnership between the visitors bureau and 14 breweries, wineries, cideries and distilleries. Each person taking the tour will be given a passport and collect stamps along the way to earn prizes. Prizes are awarded for collecting five, 12 and 20 stamps. The trail also will help highlight annual events in the county, such as Gettysburg Brew Fest, Gettysburg Wine & Music Festival and PA Cider Fest, as well as smaller-scale events like food tasting and pairing events.



The Gettysburg Adams Kiwanis Clubsponsored playground at the Gettysburg Area Recreation Authority Rec Park has been open and operating successfully.

Members of the club, Gettysburg High School Key Club and GARA recently prepared the playground for a busy season of use during a one-day service event.



Gettysburg College President Janet Morgan Riggs will retire next June. Riggs has been the college's president since 2009. She oversaw the expansion of the college faculty and a reduction of the student-faculty ratio; an

increase in student research opportunities; the integration of technology across campus; the establishment of the Garthwait Leadership Center; accreditation for the Sunderman Conservatory of Music; and an expansion of public policy offerings, in part through the expansion of the Eisenhower Institute. The board will appoint a committee to find her replacement this summer with a national search beginning in the fall.

A new National Park Service (NPS) report shows that

1,089,800 visitors to Gettysburg National Military Park

and Eisenhower National Historic Site in 2017 spent \$68.1 million in communities near the two parks. That spending supported 871 jobs in the local area and had a cumulative benefit to the local economy of \$91.8 million. According to the report, most park visitor spending was for lodging/camping (32.9 percent) followed by food and beverages (27.5 percent), gas and oil (12.1 percent), souvenirs and other expenses (10.1 percent), admissions and fees (10.0 percent), and local transportation (7.5 percent).

HACC, Central Pennsylvania's Community College,

welcomes Doreen Fisher-Bammer, Ed.D., as the College's associate provost of Virtual Learning. She previously was director of online learning and instructional technology at Northampton Community College in Bethlehem, where she saw significant growth in the school's online student population. Fisher-Bammer also served as director of e-learning for Montgomery County Community College in Blue Bell, and director of distance learning for the Delaware Campus of Widener University. HACC offers a variety of degree, certificate and diploma programs that can be completed entirely online. More than 6,500 students are currently enrolled in virtual classes at HACC.



Students at HACC, Central Pennsylvania's Community College, can complete any of HACC's Associate in Arts or Associate in Science programs and transfer all credits

earned with a grade C or higher to Wilson College in Chambersburg. HACC President John J. "Ski" Sygielski, Ed.D., and Wilson College President Barbara K. Mistick, D.M., renewed an articulation agreement that allows HACC students to seamlessly transfer their credits to Wilson College. The agreement replaces an original agreement between the two colleges signed in 2005. Students who indicate their interest in transferring before completing their 30th credit at HACC will have the Wilson application fee waived, be guaranteed admission upon completion of their associate degree from HACC and be connected with Wilson's advising resources.

Hull's Electric Service President and Partner Robert Bell was honored with the Executive Leadership Award during the Central Pennsylvania Independent Electrical Contractors annual meeting and awards gala. The award is given to an individual member who has consistently participated in the chapter's continuing education offerings to become a better leader within their company and the industry as a whole. Bell regularly attends and participates in continuing education and has served in a variety of leadership positions within the organization, while still balancing his role at Hull's Electric Service.

Mister Ed's Elephant Museum & Candy Emporium has expanded its fudge sales to the Independence Visitor Center in the heart of Philadelphia. The home of the Liberty Bell will offer the Orrtanna-made fudge in its gift shop, operated by Event Network. Mister Ed's already offers its fudge in the Gettysburg National Military Park Museum & Visitor Center gift shop, also operated by Event Network, and other businesses throughout Adams County.



The Lincoln Leadership Institute at

Gettysburg has hired Dr. Judy Morley as its newest faculty member. Morley has a doctorate in the history of the American

West, as well as a masters in consciousness studies, is a historian, entrepreneur, author and speaker, and brings a wide range of knowledge to the LLI staff. Her experience with executive leadership, business franchising, and organizational development allow her to better help prepare the next generation of business leaders.

Totem Pole Playhouse is launching the final phase of a capital campaign to raise funds for on-going renovations of the historic playhouse's facilities. The funds for the first phase, \$120,000, have been reached and expended on offices and a new rehearsal space, saving thousands of dollars in rental fees. Now the playhouse is working to raise an additional \$280,000 from grants, corporate funding and individual donations to cover renovations, including an accessible family restroom, new women's restroom facilities, a souvenir shop, ice cream stand, and a large outdoor patio deck with tables, chairs and umbrellas. Additionally, a break room with a private bathroom, changing rooms for dancers, and appropriate flooring and mirrors for the wall will be added to the new year-round rehearsal hall; lighting, sound, and film equipment will be purchased for future classes.

UPMC Pinnacle and MedCare Equipment Company LLC recently launched their new joint venture: MedCare Susquehanna Valley LLC. The accredited home medical equipment and respiratory company furnishes home medical equipment, respiratory services, and medical supplies to customers and patients. The company serves a 10-county area, including Adams County, and expects to employ up to 38 people at its Mechanicsburg warehouse and retail space.



WellSpan Health announced that renowned cardiovascular surgeon Giovanni Ciuffo, M.D., has been named director of cardiovascular surgery for the health system

and chair of cardiovascular surgery for WellSpan York Hospital. Ciuffo brings three decades of experience in the area of cardiothoracic surgery to WellSpan, and is an expert in minimally invasive heart surgery and a technique known as "bloodless heart surgery," which reduces blood loss and spares patients from the need to receive blood transfusions during their procedure. Ciuffo has a medical degree from Cagliari University Medical School in Italy. He served a residency in cardiothoracic surgery at Long Island Jewish Medical Center and residencies in general surgery at Flushing Hospital Medical Center and Cagliari University Hospital.

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ADVOCACY UPDATE

ENHANCING PENNSYLVANIA'S EMPLOYMENT OUTLOOK STATE REPRESENTATIVE DAN MOUL

The House recently passed a package of bills to reduce burdensome regulations and encourage job growth. The legislation would establish a process to review laws and regulations for possible revision or repeal, including an enhanced review process for regulations that impose a major financial burden on the Commonwealth. Pennsylvania has more than 153,000 regulations, spanning every industry, which have hampered job creation and had a negative impact on economic growth. The bills now move to the Senate for consideration.

The House also passed a bipartisan package of career and technical education bills aimed at helping job creators fill in-demand jobs. The multi-bill package, now headed to the Senate, includes measures to promote public-private partnerships; expand awareness of career training opportunities and coordination of career and workforce development opportunities, just to name a few.

The Senate is also considering welfare-to-work legislation recently passed in the House. Measures similar to these in other states have resulted in sharp increases in employment, family incomes and sustainability.

VOTING EQUIPMENT UPDATES BRING BIG COSTS ADAMS COUNTY COMMISSIONER JIM MARTIN

Recently Adams County was "blindsided" by an action of the Pennsylvania Department of State's Election Commission. PA counties, without prior notice, are being required by DOS to replace county voting equipment with new equipment from certified vendors. To date only one certified vendor exists per Sindhu Ramachandran of DOS. Other vendors are working at the federal level to obtain certification.

Fall of 2017 our Adams County Director of Elections notified the DOS that to protect the integrity and functionality of our voting machines, we were updating the computer software. DOS provided no comment, nor their intent to replace voting machines until recently. I estimate this process would cost in excess of \$1,000,000; federal funding is about \$100,000, leaving a huge county budget impact.

My fear other than cost, is that the transition to a new system will debut with limited experience during the 2020 Presidential election. I encourage readers to discuss the issue with their elected officials.

EQUINE INDUSTRY ECONOMIC IMPACT STUDY KICKS OFF ADAMS COUNTY COMMISSIONER MARTY QUALLY

Last month Russell Williams of the Hanover Shoe Farm hosted a private farm tour to educate a small group of community leaders about the equine industry in Adams County. This tour marked the unofficial beginning of an Adams County equine industry economic impact study.

A few years ago the county's fruit industry economic impact study assessed the total economic benefit to Adams County at \$580,000,000 per year.


Over the past few months staff and community partners have been winnowing down the options for the next county study. While dairy and poultry are on our list for future study, staff determined that due to the impact and ease of data collection, the equine industry should be their first solo mission.

After the brief tour at Hanover Shoe Farms I am excited to see this process unfold and see the results for this important county industry.









INCREASE SALES AND FOOT TRAFFIC FOR FREE WITH GOOGLE MY BUSINESS KARL HINDLE | WELLSPRING SEARCH LLC



Claim your business's Google My Business (GMB) listing, because it's a free and very powerful tool for generating sales and local branding. If you have already claimed your listing, then use it; many business owners set it up and forget it, but it

gives you so much value for little effort. GMB is a powerful strategy for increasing foot traffic and making the telephone ring.

When you claim your listing, your business is included in Google Maps, the Google Local Pack, Local Finder and ranks more highly in search results. Google launches new features regularly, and if you use them you'll get even more out of the opportunity.

GMB is also where you get to manage Google Reviews. Online reviews are a big driver of trust and credibility, with many customers checking them before making decisions on where to shop or whose services to use. Be sure to be proactive and professionally respond to reviews, good and bad. Also ensure changes to your listing made by customers and other users are correct.

For businesses without a website there is a web-builder tool that gives you a free site, though it is very basic.

Other features include booking and scheduling, messaging and texting services, Q&A, services and menus, call-to-action and business descriptions.

All of this is free. You just need to know how to set it all up and manage it.

OPTIMIZATION AND MANAGEMENT TIPS

There are several immediate actions once you have claimed your listing, and here are my main ones:

- 1. Add your business name, address and phone number. Be sure they are exactly consistent with how you use them anywhere else, such as on your website or directory listings – this is crucial!
- 2. Fill out every piece of information Google asks for. If you don't then someone else can (even your competitors).
- 3. Write posts often. Google My Business posts are a mini blog post that can show up in Google Maps results and the "Knowledge Graph" alongside search results. We tend to use a snippet from a blog post and a link back, or use this feature to promote events, registrations, webinars, announce promotions and sales, new product or service launches, and much more.
- 4. Use the Business Description to your advantage. Make your business stand out from the crowd and highlight what makes you the vendor to do business with. This also helps get you into the Knowledge Graph, so make the first 250 characters really work for you (you get 750 in total).
- 5. Use videos and photographs regularly. This is a great way to personalize your business and have some fun at the same time.
- 6. Ask your customers for Google reviews. Google wants more insight and information on your business.

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Online reviews will also help your local search engine optimization rankings, plus they are trusted by readers almost all of the time. **PRO TIP:** respond to your reviews with a "thank you" and acknowledgement and create a link to your GMB listing you can immediately share with customers.

If you haven't claimed or optimized your listing, then look at what you're missing out on. Or if you haven't been maintaining your GMB listing, then your customers are being wooed by your competition taking advantage of what Google is offering.
