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ADVOCACY UPDATE

RED TAPE IMPACTS EVERYONE PENNSYLVANIA SENATOR DOUG MASTRIANO (R-33)

The state has 153,000 regulations in its books that inhibit growth and progress. Have you, or your business, been impacted by this bureaucratic red tape? I want to hear from you.

The committee that I chair, the Senate Intergovernmental Operations Committee, is tackling regulatory reform in an effort to reduce red tape. Small businesses throughout Adams, Franklin, Cumberland and York counties have repeatedly told me horror stories regarding their experiences with state regulations.

The current regulatory review process is complex, confusing and cumbersome. It is especially frustrating when unelected bureaucrats interpret laws in ways that were not envisioned by the legislature. We want to live our lives and run our businesses with as little government interference as possible, yet it seems like the Harrisburg bureaucracy has lost its way and forgotten who it works for - it works for us, the taxpayers.

It is time to streamline the state's 153,000 regulations and provide a welcome business climate. Pennsylvania needs to be open for business.



Gov. Tom Wolf kicked off the state budget process Feb. 4, when he delivered his annual budget address to a joint session of the General Assembly. The governor's budget proposes to spend \$36 billion, up \$2 billion over the budget passed last June, and would do so, in part, by raiding special funds. The governor also proposes to raid the Race Horse Development Fund, threatening an industry that supports 20,000 jobs across the Commonwealth, including those at Hanover Shoe Farms.



Fortunately, the governor's spending plan will be scrutinized during budget hearings in February and March with state departments, agencies and others who rely on state funding. The hearings, which may be viewed on www.pahousegop.com, will help us determine if proposed expenditures are justified and warranted.

CHANGES IN HOW WE VOTE COMING IN 2020 REPRESENTATIVE TORREN ECKER


Voters will encounter several changes as they head to the polls for the primary election this year as part of a new law that brought about the greatest changes to how we vote in decades. In fact, one of the changes gives registered voters another option instead of standing in line at polling places.



Included in this law, voters can cast absentee ballots without an excuse, meaning that a voter can cast votes via a mail-in ballot. In the past, voters needed a legitimate excuse to obtain an absentee ballot. In addition, the voter registration deadline is moved to 15 days prior to an election, down from 30 days.

Another major change voters will see, or, rather, not see, is the option to vote straight party. While voters remain capable of voting solely for Republicans or Democrats, they will now be required to select each candidate individually.

This year, the Pennsylvania primary election will be held on April 28, 2020. So, read up on candidates and head to the polls to vote. Having won the 2018 primary by one vote, I know firsthand how each vote counts.

In 2018, the average daily commute for workers grew nearly 5 minutes to just shy of an hour roundtrip daily. Over the course of a year, that equals 225 hours on average per commuter lost driving instead of working, relaxing, or spending time with family and friends. In addition to the stress, the impact on our health and environment are significant.

Commute PA is a one-stop solution for transportation solutions for anyone living or working in Adams County. Commuters earn rewards for tracking green trips, can find carpool matching to find people living and working near you,

use the Commute Calculator to see how much you can save, locate transit routes, find a vanpool, learn about walking, biking or telecommuting. Active participants recording weekly work trips are eligible for our emergency ride home reimbursement up to 6 times a year.

Commuters can go online or download the app and start tracking telework, transit, carpool, bicycle, walk or vanpool trips for work and pleasure to earn points for each trip. Points can be redeemed for discounts and coupons for dining, shopping, services, activities, and more. Commuters can also see statistics on how much money you saved, gallons of gas saved, calories burned, and emissions



prevented by using an environmentallyfriendly commute.

Commute PA is a program of Commuter Services of Pennsylvania, a non-profit serving those who live and work in our 13-county area. Funded by federal Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality funds our free services, we work to reduce traffic congestion by helping commuters find alternatives to driving alone and working with employers to help their workforce find solutions for parking, transportation, telework programs, and workforce retention. 


