ACNB Bank recently promoted Laurie A. Laub, Douglas A. Seibel and Thomas R. Stone to Executive Vice President. Reporting to James Helt, ACNB bank president, the officers are based at the bank's Operations Center in Gettysburg. Laub, who joined ACNB in 2005, will serve as the bank's chief credit and operations officer, overseeing credit administration, loan and deposit operations, information systems and special assets. An ACNB employee since 2008, Seibel will serve as the chief lending and revenue officer, in charge of all lending teams, treasuring management and sales development. Stone joined ACNB in 2009 and, as chief community banking officer, will oversee retail banking, human resources, marketing/branding and facilities management.

The Adams County Farmers Market Association opens a new Thursday afternoon farmers market on Lincoln Square in Gettysburg beginning in mid-May. From 2-6 p.m. through October, find fresh local foods. This market is in lieu of the Steinwehr Avenue market, which is closed during the construction of Appalachian Brewing Company and Best Western Gettysburg Battlefield.

Family First Health's Kids Against Cavities program visited Vida Charter School recently. Dental hygienists performed preventative screenings on more than 120 students. Family First Health, with offices in York County and Gettysburg, has offered this mobile program for several years, but this marks its Adams County debut.

The **Gettysburg Hotel** recently completed several service projects. Staff raised \$500 for Ruth's Harvest, a food program that provides a backpack of food to elementary aged children for the weekend. They also donated several boxes of non-perishable food items to the Adams Rescue **Mission** and toys to Toys for Tots.

In celebration of the Centennial of the National Park Service in 2016, rangers and other staff at 409 national parks will work closely with community partners, local businesses, schools and governments to celebrate a century of serving the American public. Partnering with the **Gettysburg** Foundation, the Gettysburg National Military **Park** is funding legacy projects that address long-term preservation needs at Cemetery Ridge and Little Round Top. Additionally, the park will host numerous events and programs throughout the year with community partners.

Penn State University recently cut the ribbon on new housing for College of Agricultural Sciences graduate students working with the Penn State Fruit Research & **Extension Center** in Biglerville to benefit the area's fruit industry. The duplex, located near Rice Avenue in Biglerville, was the result of a \$250,000 endowment by the State Horticultural Association of Pennsylvania.

The Upper Adams School District recently approved new courses for Biglerville High School with a focus on 21st century careers. Included are mobile phone applications designs, introduction to computer science and sound technologies. The school is also moving to allow accounting as a math credit and partnering with HACC on college algebra, principles of math and principles of chemistry.

YWCA, one of the nation's largest and oldest women's organizations, announced a new brand awareness campaign to reintroduce the Y, share its life-changing work and invite people to join them on their mission to empower women and eliminate racism. LEGISLATIVE

Please review this commentary provided by Senator Rich Alloway (R) regarding education funding.

Over the past two years, Governor Wolf and his allies have made a number of dubious claims pertaining to education funding. There is no doubt that state government has an obligation to provide adequate funding for our schools, and like most lawmakers, I support the principle of ensuring our children receive a top-notch education. However, the only way we can move forward toward that goal is by being honest and setting the record straight on education funding.

The most pervasive lie parroted by the Wolf Administration is the mythical "billion-dollar cut to education," which never actually took place. No matter how you twist and manipulate the numbers, there was simply never a cut of a billion dollars in direct state funding to education under any governor before Wolf was elected.

In my first year in office in 2009, the state's education budget totaled approximately \$9.1 billion. An additional \$650 million was made available through federal stimulus funding that was intended to cushion the economic crisis brought on by the recession. Approximately \$100 million fewer dollars were allocated in the 2010-11 budget, but this funding was backfilled with an additional \$350 million in stimulus money. While this represented an increase in total dollars allocated to school districts, school boards and administrators were warned that the additional funding was temporary and should be spent conservatively in order to prevent future funding problems.


When the federal stimulus funding expired during Governor Corbett's first year in office, it created a shortfall of approximately a billion dollars. I joined my fellow lawmakers in supporting more than \$350 million in additional state funding for schools. While this additional state funding helped meet the needs of the education community following the loss of federal funding, this total represented a reduced appropriation for schools from the previous year.

However, allocations for education have increased every year since to a record-high \$10.2 billion in 2014-15.

Today, total spending on education is higher than at any other time in Pennsylvania's history.

The budget recently approved by lawmakers went one step further by devoting a historic high of nearly \$10.7 billion to our schools. That is, until Governor Wolf cut more than \$3 billion dollars from education through his line-item vetoes in December. This cut was the first time in the state's history that a governor saw fit to cut education funding by a billion dollars or more. The financial consequences of this cut have been more dire and calamitous than any previous gubernatorial action on the budget. When the governor talks about cuts to education, the conversation should start with the \$3 billion he is continuing to withhold from our schools.

The governor recently announced that his 2016-17 budget would include a total of approximately \$577 million more for education since the last fully enacted budget, even though most of these dollars will be lost to a public employee pension system that is in desperate need of repair. My position on this issue remains unchanged – we should not devote significant new resources to our schools without addressing the biggest financial pitfall they currently face. New payments for pensions totaled nearly a billion dollars in the current fiscal year. That money would be better spent in the classroom instead of funding a system that taxpayers can no longer afford.

Committee Updates

Business & Industry

The Business & Industry committee worked with local school district officials to plan the second annual Business Education Summit, held Feb. 23. The focus of this year's summit was determining specific skills gaps in Adams County's workforce and identifying opportunities for businesses and schools to work together in better supporting our future employees.

Environmental

The committee is working on a Green Recognition certification for chamber member businesses. Businesses that meet certain criteria related to environmental stewardship, like recycling and energy efficiency programs, may apply for the recognition and receive a window cling to promote green efforts. The committee also discussed concerns about recycling services.

Golf Outing

Plans are underway for the 15th John R. White Golf Tournament, set for June 9 at Carroll Valley Golf at Ski Liberty. Confirmed sponsors are Adams Electric Cooperative Inc., C.S. Davidson, Carl E. Frantz Inc. and Schmuck Lumber Company. Committee members are currently seeking additional sponsorships.

Legislative

The committee is finalizing plans for the State Legislative Luncheon Friday, March 11, at 11:30 a.m. (page 4). Topics for discussion suggested by the committee include the state budget, pension reform, liquor reform, liquor privatization and medical marijuana. Reports were heard from Congressman Perry's Office, including a discussion on the Syrian refugee program, State of the Union Address, gun reform, upcoming session goals and federal budget. Marketing Advisory

The committee is working with chamber staff on a new membership directory (information on pages 6-7). Discussion also focused on a potential partnership with the *Gettysburg Times* on the Gettysburg 2 Go App, the official app of Gettysburg and Adams County.

Membership

The chamber began January with 533 members, gained five and dropped four, for a total of 534 members as of Jan. 31. Nine milestone membership anniversaries were recognized at the Jan. 27 County Connections breakfast. Also at the breakfast, members raised \$472 for Survivors Inc. and SCCAP. The committee is working on a membership survey. Eight applications for Chamber Ambassadors were received, with an orientiation held Feb. 12.

Planning is underway for the April 3 event. Vendor applications are being collected by committee members (see cover story). Judges, chefs, celebrities and secret ingredients are confirmed for the Top Local Celebrity Chef Competition.

Wine Festival

The committee is planning for the Sept. 10-11 event. To date, 27 wineries are confirmed with six on the waiting list. Staff will work to adjust the festival layout and formalize a weather contingency plan. RFP's for rentals, glasses, printing and security were received and reviewed.

Community Partners

16th Annual Adams County Career Fair

The 16th annual Adams County Career Fair is on the Gettysburg College campus March 9. Tenth grade students from all six Adams County public school districts, along with students from two local private schools and the Lincoln Intermediate Unit #12, will attend the career fair. They'll get the inside scoop on three careers of their choosing, from about 60 career offerings. Plus, they'll have the chance to experience a college campus.

This is not a job fair; it is intended to help students chart their path from high school to the career they will pursue for their working lives.

Career speakers explain what classes the students might need in high school, what degrees are needed and what avenues to follow for further training or schooling. The speakers can also help the students understand what it is like to perform a job on a daily basis. Career speakers are all volunteers from our community. Some have been involved in the career fair for years and have influenced hundreds of youth on their career choices. Many of the students would not otherwise have had the opportunity to speak with someone involved in some of the fields.
