Chamber Recognizes Outstanding Leaders

The Gettysburg Adams Chamber of Commerce recently recognized outstanding community leaders during its annual Awards Breakfast, part of a month-long celebration of Chamber Member Appreciation Month in May. Recipients are Small Business Person of the Year, **Stacey Green**, Biggerstaff's Catering; Educator of the Year, **Nancy Cook**, Rolling Acres Elementary, Littlestown School District; and Best Small Place to Work in Adams County, **The Lodges at Gettysburg**.

"Adams County is home to exceptional leaders who contribute to the local economy and serve the community," said Gettysburg Adams Chamber of Commerce President Carrie Stuart. "The chamber thanks these outstanding award winners, and the entire local business community, for their many contributions to keeping Adams County strong, viable and growing."

Small Business Person of the Year Stacey Green has grown her food business from a small truck stop restaurant to a successful catering company with 17 years of service to the community. Biggerstaff's Catering currently holds the food service contract for the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, where a full-time staff of five and additional part-time employees provide daily lunch specials for students and staff and cater private and corporate events from the Refectory. A regular recipient of "best caterer" awards, Green has developed strong relationships with local businesses. She has also found new and innovative ways to succeed in the competitive business, adding a "Quiz Night" to the monthly agenda, where the community can enjoy a meal and trivia, and a "Bistro Night," which gives families the opportunity to purchase meals to put in the freezer for later use. Actively involved in the community, Stacey is a current or past board member of the Gettysburg Adams Chamber of Commerce, Gettysburg Hospital Foundation, Gettysburg Wine & Music Festival, Adams County Community Foundation and Gettysburg Borough Zoning Hearing Board, and is a supporter of many other organizations.

Educator of the Year Nancy Cook has been an elementary school teacher for 29 years, most recently in a third grade classroom at Rolling Acres Elementary in Littlestown. A creative, enthusiastic and dedicated teacher, Cook uses a variety of teaching techniques, skills and her wealth of experience to serve the needs of her students. She strives not only to meet her students' educational needs, but also their emotional and social needs. She also works to engage parents as partners in educators by writing curriculum, organizing field trips and soliciting donations from local businesses to help fund them, and managing the Scholastic Book Club points program to build a trade book library for educator enrichment. She is also dedicated to boosting the morale of other teachers as the chair of the Rolling Acres Teachers' Social Club. Outside of the classroom, Cook is an active member and elder at Gettysburg

ACNB Corporation approved four proposals during its annual meeting May 2. The first proposal fixed the number of directors of the corporation to 16; the second fixed the number of Class 1 Directors at six; the third proposal set the number of Class 2 Directors at six; and the fourth fixed the number of Class 3 Directors at four. Shareholders reelected Frank Elsner III, Scott L. Kelley and Daniel W. Potts and elected James P. Helt as Class 3 Directors. Thomas A. Ritter was named a Class 2 Director. Each member of the corporation's board also serves on the board of the corporation's banking subsidiary, **ACNB Bank**.

ACNB Corporation reported net income of \$2,637,000 for the first quarter of 2017, compared to \$2,547,000 over the same period for 2016, an increase of 4%. Net income on a per share basis was \$0.43 for the first three months of 2017 and \$0.42 for the same period in 2016. Total assets of ACNB Corporation at March 31 were \$1.24 billion, an increase of 8% from 2016. Total deposits increased by 9% from the previous year to \$990 million. Total loans rose 10% to \$952 million, as compared to \$867 million at March 31, 2016. A 4% increase in stockholders' equity resulted in an aggregate of \$122 million at March 31, compared to \$117 million at March 31, 2016.





Adams County High School Seniors Recognized for Self Improvement

The Adams County Economic Education Foundation recently honored senior students who demonstrated significant improvement over the course of their high school careers with the Dwight D. Eisenhower Senior Self Improvement Award.

The monetary award, given to up to five students from each of Adams County's six school districts, recognizes students who improved their grades, attitudes, attendance, behavior and service to others while in high school.

"We're pleased to honor these high school seniors, each of whom have overcome adversity to become good students and make the best of their education," said Adams County Economic Education Foundation Executive Director Carrie Stuart. "These award winners are our future workforce, and any local business would be fortunate to employ them because of their strong work ethic, determination and growth."

Five students from each school district are eligible for the award. The selection committee considers a completed application, past and present report cards, attendance and discipline records, two letters of recommendation, a written statement by the student and a brief description of service to others. The non-profit Adams County Economic Education Foundation bridges the gap between the business and education communities to prepare students for higher education and the workforce. More than 30,000 students in Adams County have benefited since 1991.
